Senator Thune's Office – Judy Vrchota

NDAA: On June 14, the Senate Armed Services Committee (SASC) voted 22-3 to advance the National Defense Authorization Act (NDAA) for fiscal year (FY) 2025 to the Senate floor. Congress has successfully passed an NDAA 63 years in a row. If passed before the end of the year, this NDAA would be the 64th annual defense authorization bill passed by Congress.

The Senate's version of the annual NDAA supports a total of \$923.3 billion in FY 2025 funding for national defense. Within this topline, the legislation authorizes \$878.4 billion for the Department of Defense (DOD) and \$33.4 billion for national security programs within the Department of Energy. Under SASC Ranking Member Roger Wicker's leadership, this topline represents a \$25 billion increase to the defense budget so we can adequately meet today's growing threats from the new axis of aggressors: China, Russia, Iran, and North Korea. It also authorizes a 4.5 percent pay raise for servicemembers and a 2 percent pay raise for DOD civilian employees.

The next step for the legislation would be a full vote in the Senate. Senator Thune will continue to fight for pro-South Dakota provisions to be included in the final version, which historically becomes law at the end of the calendar year.

Thune requests included in the markup:

- 1. Full B-21 funding, including \$2.65 billion for R&D and \$2.68 billion for procurement.
- 2. \$282 million Ellsworth B-21 MilCon
 - 1. \$44M for Squadron Operations
 - 2. \$79M for Alert Apron Environmental Protection Shelters
 - 3. \$54M for other Environmental Protection Shelters
 - 4. \$105M for the Weapons Generation Facility

Senator Thune joined the Midwest Honor Flight at the WWII Memorial. It was a fantastic event on the eve of the D-Day anniversary with over 60 SD veterans, including two WWII veterans. There was a school group at the memorial when the veterans arrived and they lined the pathway clapping for the veterans as they all got off the buses – it was such a neat moment.

Here are some of his remarks from the 80th anniversary of the heroic landings on D-Day.

80 years ago today, over 150,000 allied troops stormed the beaches of Normandy, and carried with them the hopes of the free world. Undeterred by logistical details, bad weather, or the threat of the Nazis, these front-liners of the Greatest Generation lowered the ramps of their landing craft and set out on the daunting task of wresting Europe from the clutches of the Axis Powers.

What makes the members of that Greatest Generation so great is their commitment to, and willingness to put their lives on the line for, the values we Americans hold dear. The American troops who landed at Omaha Beach, Utah Beach, and Pointe du Hoc on June 6, 1944 selflessly dedicated themselves to the enduring cause of freedom for which our nation stands.

I've walked through the American cemetery at Normandy and seen with my own eyes the headstones of the American soldiers who never made it home. These patriots paid the ultimate price for the freedoms we enjoy today, and we owe them a tremendous debt of gratitude for their sacrifice. Dozens of D-Day veterans, most now over 100 years old, made the trip back to Normandy to pay their respects. We should join them in remembering their brothers-in-arms.

Today, as we mourn the lives lost on that fateful day, we also celebrate the cause for which they fought. All those who served in World War II, from the European theater to the islands of the Pacific where my father served as a Navy pilot, deserve our gratitude and recognition. We can honor their legacy by upholding the American traditions of faith, family, and freedom.

In his Order of the Day for D-Day, General Dwight D. Eisenhower told the troops: "You are about to embark upon the Great Crusade, toward which we have striven these many months. The eyes of the world are on you. The hopes and prayers of liberty-loving people everywhere march with you." They did not let us down. May God bless the families of the fallen, the veterans who came home, and those who continue to serve.

- (*Recognizing Military Service Act*) which will allow military service men and women who choose to put their public loans in deferment or forbearance during a deployment, to be allowed to count that timeframe toward loan forgiveness (currently it is not). Dusty had planned to introduce this in the coming weeks (*it will hopefully be a bipartisan bill*).
- FY 2025 NDAA (*this past June*) which honors nation's commitment to Veterans by fully funding medical health care (*at approx \$113 Billion*) and fully funds Veterans' benefits and toxic exposure-related needs for Fiscal Year 2025.
- (Vietnam Veterans Liver Fluke Cancer Study Act) which would require the VA to conduct studies and report back on the prevalence of bile duct cancer in Vets who serving during Vietnam conflict. This bill was introduced last year but has not moved out of the House Veterans Committee yet (to my knowledge). Important to note, the VA is still taking steps to expedite care for all Vets who were exposed to cancer-inducing toxins during service in military (home or abroad).
- Dusty and our team are currently in conversations with national, state, and local personnel in discussing the challenges to Veteran Rural Transport. Our Leg Director has been having several conversations with VSOs in the state to get a better understanding of how the HRTG programs may provide a path forward if the threshold is raised from 7 PPSM to 10 PPSM.

• House bill that came out of House Veterans Affairs Committee (*this has not made it to the Floor*) that addressed long-term care for Vets and centers around idea of a three-year pilot program for eligible Vets to received Assisted Living Care (by VA) given the proponents feel this would significantly cut costs for VA (given Nursing Home fees are exorbitantly higher).

Office continues to engage in congressional casework for all South Dakotans on a daily basis. They liaise with federal agencies and work to help everyday South Dakotans get status updates, answers, or action (where feasible) as it relates to a federal agency issue (i.e. IRS, SSA, USCIS, DOS, VA, DOE, DOS, etc). They cannot demand outcomes, but can rattle cages and advocate wherever feasibly possible.

Support Changes to Highly Rural Transit Grant Requirements

WHEREAS, The Current VA Policy states that a Veteran may be eligible for beneficiary travel services if the following criteria are met:

- Have a service-connected (SC) rating of 30 percent of more, or
- Are traveling for treatment of a SC condition, or
- Receive a VA pension, or your income does not exceed the maximum annual VA pension rate, or
- Are traveling for a scheduled compensation of pension, or if not otherwise eligible as noted above and;
- Have a vision impairment, spinal cord injury or disorder, or a double of multiple amputation who's travel is connection with care provided through a VA special disabilities rehabilitation program (including programs provided by spinal cord injury centers, blind rehabilitation centers and prosthetics rehabilitation centers) if such care is provided on an inpatient basis or during a period in which you are provided with temporary lodging at a facility or the Department to make such care more accessible. including programs; and

Whereas: the VA has modified where medical treatment can be provided based on distance from a VA medical facility. In rural areas, there has been no subsequent adjustment in travel for medical care at the VA, CBOC or Care in the Community. Service-connected veterans below 30% SC disability deserve the right to transportation for medical care as those that are SC at 30% or more; and

Whereas: The US government told the soldiers on entering the service that they would take care of them. There was no mention of how disabled they would have to be to get access to that

medical coverage or disability levels brought about while under military care; and

Whereas: It has been shown that the current transportation system has proven to be almost noneffective in rural areas (and some urban areas) because of the shortage of volunteer drivers, inadequate DAV vans (for mobility impaired/ handicapped) and too few VA VTS vehicles it is apparent that the answer to the current situation should be VA support of community transit or similar public, independent, local or regional transportation systems which are by law required to be ADA compliant; and

Whereas: From the current reports from VA transportation over 75% of ridership IN URBAN AREAS, is on VA VTS vehicles and only 25% by DAV vans it is apparent that the current system of relying on DAV vans that are non-ADA compliant in Rural areas and the lack of VA VTS vehicles and drivers for those Rural areas does not fulfill the mission of caring for those who have born the battle; and

Whereas: Prevention and Early Intervention will improve the veteran's quality of life allowing and enabling all veteran's health care to preclude or reduce the impact of medical issues. Allowing SC disabled vet to be more proactive on his care will allow the VA medical team to catch medical issues before they become more serious. In rural area's travel cost is prohibitive; and

Whereas: The current DAV van transportation system does not work in rural areas. The DAV Transportation does not meet the requirements of the American Disabilities Act. In rural areas most volunteer drivers are over the age of 65 and not trained to handle medical emergencies and due to age are physically incapable of rendering medical assistance even those the vets being transported are in a higher risk category. None of the DAV Vans are equipped with AED's; and

Whereas: The VTS / VA transportation has a 30% SC disability rating required to get travel for medical care. In rural area's VTS transportation does not have good coverage as trips can be in excess of over 250 miles round trip and total trip time in exceed 8 hours.; and

Whereas: Veterans in living in rural areas that are less than 30% SC disabled are not reimbursed for travel. The standard of living in rural areas is not as good as in urban areas. There are 14.9 million disabled Veterans in the United States, 5.6 million Service-Connected disabled Vets in the US. In 2022 there were 1,134,807 that had a 10-20% service-connected rating, 609,802 with a 30-40% with a SC disability rating, 604,495 @a 50-60% rating and 2,071,610 that were rated as 70 -100% Service-connected disabled. The 1.13 million SC vets below the 30% SC disability level should to be treated like the those over 30%; and

Whereas: On March 17, 2023, the Department of Veterans Affairs announced an updated version of its 1959 mission statement. The new mission statement is "To fulfill Presidents Lincoln's promise op care for those who have served in our nation's military and for their families, caregivers, and survivors. Note there are no qualifications implied or stated; NOW

Therefore Be it Resolved that the Disabled American Veterans in State Convention assembled in Deadwood, South Dakota on April 27, 2024, that the Current VA Policy be modified so "A veteran may be eligible for beneficiary travel Services if the following criteria are met:

• Have a service-connected (SC) rating of 0 percent of more, or

• Are traveling for treatment for a treatment approved by the VA at a VA medical facility, a CBOC, or an approved Care in the Community appointment. The only requirement for travel reimbursement is if the appointment was made by VA.

• Receive a VA pension, or your income does not exceed the maximum annual VA pension rate, or

• Are traveling for a scheduled compensation of pension, or if not otherwise eligible as noted above and;

• Have a vision impairment, spinal cord injury or disorder, or a double of multiple amputation who's travel is connection with care provided through a VA special disabilities rehabilitation program (including programs provided by spinal cord injury centers, blind rehabilitation centers and prosthetics rehabilitation centers) if such care is provided on an inpatient basis or during a period in which you are provided with temporary lodging at a facility or the Department to make such care more accessible. including programs.
